FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Kia ora whānau. Ngā mihi mahana ki a koutou.

This week I've been blessed to be able to be on camp in Wellington with Alice Dunstan and the 28 students of Moa Class - and it's been fantastic! We've had a very, very busy week, including an opportunity to stand in Suzanne Aubert's resting place and a sleepover at Wellington Zoo! Planes, trains and buses and a huge amount of footsteps - a very special week!

During our camp, the theme of history has emerged - we have thoroughly enjoyed discussing and reflecting on our history. Ricky, the educator at Pukeahu National War Memorial, spoke with us about history and said, "History is not the past, it's our attempt to explain the past". We visited the New Zealand Police Museum and remembered some of the more disturbing events of our history - from the Erebus disaster to the sinking of the Rainbow Warrior to the mass murder at Aramoana. On our journey, our hikoi, we've seen monuments and memorials to mark some significant moments in history, from "Hinerangi" and "The Unknown Warrior" at Pukeahu to "He Toa Taumata Rau" at the New Zealand Police Museum. We've seen the creative genius of Richard Taylor and Tania Rodger at Wētā Workshop. We sat together in the waka huia (the wooden treasure box) at He Tohu inside the National Library where we listened to kōrero about 3 iconic constitutional documents; the 1835 "He Whakaputanga o te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tireni - Declaration of Independence of the United Tribes of New Zealand", the 1840 "Te Tiriti o Waitangi - Treaty of Waitangi", and the 1893 "Women's Suffrage Petition - Te Petihana Whakamana Pōti Wahine". We saw the original documents from these critical pieces of our living history.

On our journey we reflected lots on the histories of the places we were visiting and the stories they represented, and we remembered that our history is remembered in the stories we are told and go on to tell - from the Gospel writers to the historians and archivisits, from our grandparents and their grandparents to our saints, from photographs and paintings to songs and poems. We are living in a time and place in history, and we too will be remembered in photographs and songs and stories. And we are on a journey, a hikoi through that history too. We have consistently been complimented on our engagement and great behaviour (including a special shout out on the plane on our arrival in Te Whanganui-a-Tara), and our students have consistently expressed their gratitude. We've been hosted by some very special people too along our hikoi. It's been a very special week, a very special moment in history.

A huge thank you to Sis Vasconcelos, Gian Silva, and Gisela Hardman, who have joined the hikoi to Wellington and have added so much to the camp experience for our students. Thanks too to the families who have supported us and who have enabled us to get to Wellington Camp. And a special thanks to our wonderful Alice Dunstan, who has worked tirelessly all year (and especially this week), coordinating fundraising efforts, making bookings, and preparing and executing an excellent camp programme overflowing with amazing experiences, enabling huge growth for our young people!

TWO young Oueenstown sisters are overjoyed they've been picked for major roles in Invercargill Musical Theatre's production of the hugely popular Matilda the Musical next year.

Rhiannon Hookey, who's just 8, will be one of three girls who'll rotate in the title role of Matilda, who's said to combine "actoribiting with intellingers and

And Tatum, 11, who like her sister attends St Joseph's School, is one of two girls who'll share the role of Alice.

The girls' mum, Greer Ell, says though they only moved from Auckland two and a-half years ago — where Tatum had

The Nano Nagle Charitable Trust

The Nano Nagle Charitable Trust (NNCT) was established in New Zealand by the Presentation Sisters and Friends of Nano in 2009 to support children unable to attend a Catholic School because of financial hardship.

Venerable Nano Nagle, was born into a wealthy family in Ballygriffin, Ireland in 1718. Because of the Penal law system which prohibited Catholic education she was educated in France. Disturbed by the plight of the people in Ireland she dared to begin Catholic education in Cork despite significant personal danger. She became a pioneer of Catholic education in Ireland. In 1775 she founded the Presentation Sisters and continues to inspire Presentation Sisters and Associates throughout the world.

The Presentation Sisters first came to New Zealand in 1950 and opened schools in Taita, Paraparaumu and Green Island. The Sisters are now involved in a variety of ministries with poor and disadvantaged people. Nano Nagle was declared Venerable by Pope Francis on 31 October 2013 recognising her as a woman of faith, hope and heroic virtue.

Nano Nagle Prayer

Lord God. You raise up people from age to age To speak anew Your Word to us And to show us your ways. Such is Nano Nagle. In days when courage is needed, You give us this woman of strength to walk before us with conviction. In days of great change, You present us with a prophet whose faith is firm. As the light of her lantern brought hope into the lives made wretched by poverty and oppression, so may she inspire us to compassionate action for those in need around us.
